Privacy notice for alumni

St Peter's Church of England (Voluntary Controlled) Primary School

Introduction

Under UK data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how our school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about alumni of the school.

We, St Peter's Church of England (Voluntary Controlled) Primary School, Myneer Park, Coggeshall, Essex, CO6 1YU, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of UK data protection law.

Our data protection officer is Sam Wilding (see 'Contact us' below).

The personal data we hold

Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about you includes, but is not restricted to:

- Name
- > Contact details
- > Details about your time at the school, including records of your achievements and interests
- > Records of contributions you have made to the school since leaving, such as your time, expertise or money
- Records of how you have engaged with our alumni network, including emails you have opened, events attended, mailing lists you have signed up to and any other interactions
- > Bank details and other financial information, if you make any payments to the school
- > Records associated with Gift Aid claims on donations
- Information about your use of our information and communications systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers)

We may also collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) information about you that falls into 'special categories' of more sensitive personal data. This includes, but is not restricted to:

- > Photographs of your time at the school
- > Information required to manage your attendance at alumni events, including access arrangements and dietary requirements

We may also hold data about you that we have received from other organisations, including other schools.

Why we use this data

We use the data listed above to:

- a) Help us build a community around the school
- b) Offer enrichment and career development opportunities to current pupils
- c) Raise extra money so that we can continue to improve the experience pupils get from the school
- d) Notify you of alumni events you may be interested in
- e) Keep you up to date with school news
- f) Help us promote the school
- g) Keep you safe and comfortable while attending alumni events
- h) Tailor the communications we send to you, to ensure they are appropriate and relevant

i) Make sure our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers) are used appropriately, legally and safely

Use of your personal data for marketing purposes

Where you have given us consent to do so, we may send you marketing information by email or text promoting school events, campaigns, charitable causes or services that may be of interest to you.

You can withdraw consent or 'opt out' of receiving these emails and/or texts at any time by contacting us (see 'Contact us' below).

Use of your personal data in automated decision making and profiling

We do not currently process any alumni personal data through automated decision making or profiling. If this changes in the future, we will amend any relevant privacy notices in order to explain the processing to you, including your right to object to it.

Use of your personal data for filtering and monitoring purposes

While you're in our school, we may monitor your use of our information and communications systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers). We do this so that we can:

- > Comply with health and safety and other legal obligations
- > Comply with our policies (e.g. child protection policy, IT acceptable use policy) and our legal obligations
- > Keep our network(s) and devices safe from unauthorised access, and prevent malicious software from harming our network(s)

Our lawful basis for using this data

Our lawful bases for processing your personal data for the purposes listed in section 3 above are as follows:

- ➤ In accordance with the 'legal obligation' basis we need to process data to meet our responsibilities under data protection laws (records retentions schedule)
- ➤ In accordance with the 'consent' basis we may seek your consent to process your data for specific purposes, such as sending you marketing communications or newsletters.
- ➤ In accordance with the 'legitimate interests' basis We may process your data where we have a legitimate interest, such as:
 - o to maintain relationships with our alumni community and promote the school.

Where you have provided us with consent to use your data, you may withdraw this consent at any time. We will make this clear when requesting your consent, and explain how you would go about withdrawing consent if you wish to do so.

Our basis for using special category data

For 'special category' data, we only collect and use it when we have both a lawful basis, as set out above, and 1 of the following conditions for processing as set out in UK data protection law:

- > We have obtained your explicit consent to use your personal data in a certain way
- > We need to perform or exercise an obligation or right in relation to employment, social security or social protection law
- > We need to protect an individual's vital interests (i.e. protect your life or someone else's life), in situations where you're physically or legally incapable of giving consent
- > The data concerned has already been made manifestly public by you
- > We need to process it for the establishment, exercise or defence of legal claims

- > We need to process it for reasons of substantial public interest as defined in legislation
- > We need to process it for health or social care purposes, and the processing is done by, or under the direction of, a health or social work professional or by any other person obliged to confidentiality under law
- > We need to process it for public health reasons, and the processing is done by, or under the direction of, a health professional or by any other person obliged to confidentiality under law
- > We need to process it for archiving purposes, scientific or historical research purposes, or for statistical purposes, and the processing is in the public interest

For criminal offence data, we will only collect and use it when we have both a lawful basis, as set out above, and a condition for processing as set out in UK data protection law. Conditions include:

- > We have obtained your consent to use it in a specific way
- > We need to protect an individual's vital interests (i.e. protect your life or someone else's life), in situations where you're physically or legally incapable of giving consent
- > The data concerned has already been made manifestly public by you
- > We need to process it for, or in connection with, legal proceedings, to obtain legal advice, or for the establishment, exercise or defence of legal rights
- > We need to process it for reasons of substantial public interest as defined in legislation

Collecting this data

While the majority of information we collect about you is mandatory, there is some information that can be provided voluntarily.

Whenever we seek to collect information from you, we make it clear whether you must provide this information (and if so, what the possible consequences are of not complying), or whether you have a choice.

Most of the data we hold about you will come from you, but we may also hold data about you from:

- > Local authorities
- > Government departments or agencies
- > Police forces, courts or tribunals

How we store this data

We keep personal information about you while you volunteer at our school. We may also keep it beyond your work at our school if this is necessary. Our records management and retention schedule sets out how long we keep information about governors and other volunteers. A copy of this can be obtained from the school office.

We have put in place appropriate security measures to prevent your personal information from being accidentally lost, used or accessed in an unauthorised way, altered or disclosed.

We will dispose of your personal data securely when we no longer need it.

Who we share data with

We do not share information about you with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary (and it complies with UK data protection law), we may share personal information about you with:

> Our local authority, Essex County Council – to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns

- > Government departments or agencies
- Ofsted
- > Suppliers and service providers:
 - filtering and monitoring
 - IT support Cablers
- > Financial organisations
- > Our auditors
- > Survey and research organisations
- > Health authorities
- Security organisations
- > Health and social welfare organisations
- > Professional advisers and consultants
- > Charities and voluntary organisations
- > Police forces, courts and tribunals

Transferring data internationally

We may share personal information about you with the following international third parties, where different data protection legislation applies:

- > Other schools or educational establishments
- > Government departments or agencies
- > Security organisations
- > App or cloud server providers
- > Filtering and monitoring providers

Where we transfer your personal data to a third-party country or territory, we will do so in accordance with UK data protection law.

In cases where we have to set up safeguarding arrangements to complete this transfer, you can get a copy of these arrangements by contacting us.

Your rights

How to access personal information that we hold about you

You have a right to make a 'subject access request' to gain access to personal information that we hold about you.

If you make a subject access request, and if we do hold information about you, we will (subject to any exemptions that may apply):

- > Give you a description of it
- > Tell you why we are holding and processing it, and how long we will keep it for
- > Explain where we got it from, if not from you
- > Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
- > Let you know whether any automated decision-making is being applied to the data, and any consequences of this

> Give you a copy of the information in an intelligible form

You may also have the right for your personal information to be transmitted electronically to another organisation in certain circumstances.

If you would like to make a request, please contact us (see 'Contact us' below).

Your other rights regarding your data

Under data protection law, you have certain rights regarding how your personal data is used and kept safe. For example, you have the right to:

- > Object to our use of your personal data
- > Prevent your data being used to send direct marketing
- > Object to and challenge the use of your personal data for decisions being taken by automated means (by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- In certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data corrected
- > In certain circumstances, have the personal data we hold about you deleted or destroyed, or restrict its processing
- > Withdraw your consent, where you previously provided it for the collection, processing and transfer of your personal data for a specific purpose
- In certain circumstances, be notified of a data breach
- > Make a complaint to the Information Commissioner's Office
- > Claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the data protection regulations

Complaints

We take any complaints about our collection and use of personal information very seriously.
